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## **School Resource Deputy Program**

The primary mission of the School Resource Deputy (SRD) Program is to maintain and uphold a safe and secure learning environment while fostering positive relationships within the school community. The School Resource Deputies are not school disciplinarians. SRDs must recognize they will not become involved in discipline as it is a school matter and will be handled by school administrators. To achieve the mission effectively, the SRD program should embrace multiple roles: mentor/educator, counselor, and peace officer.

1. SRDs serve as mentors and educators by actively engaging with students in various capacities. SRDs can lead the school administration by providing educational sessions on topics such as safety, bullying prevention, drug education awareness, and other current issues.
2. SRDs play a crucial role in supporting the well-being of students. They can serve as a resource for students experiencing difficulties, referral to appropriate support services, and intervention when necessary. SRDs can also collaborate with school officials to effectively develop and implement strategies for addressing student needs.
3. SRDs are responsible for maintaining safety and security within the school environment. SRDs play a crucial role in emergency preparedness and response, ensuring that students and staff are prepared for various crisis situations.

By supporting these roles, SRDs can achieve the overall goal of maintaining a safe and secure learning environment while also fostering positive relationships within the school community. Building trust and rapport with students, staff, and parents is essential for effective communication and collaboration, which are key components of successful school safety initiatives.

## **School Resource Deputy Program Services and Meetings**

## **School Resource Deputy Program Collaborations**

The SRD program works to connect students and parents to necessary services. The SRD program has established partnerships with the Los Angeles County Department of Youth Development (DYD) and with the Office of Violence Prevention (OVP).

**Department of Youth Development (DYD):** This partnership allows the SRD program to connect students with resources such as the youth diversion program and other valuable services tailored to the needs of young people. The youth diversion program provides alternative interventions for youth involved in minor offenses, aiming to prevent further involvement in the criminal justice system and promote positive behavior change. By leveraging the resources and expertise of the Department of Youth Development, the SRD program can effectively address the needs of at-risk students and provide them with opportunities for rehabilitation and support.

**Office of Violence Prevention (OVP):** Collaborating with the OVP enables the SRD program to assist students who have been impacted by violence, whether on school campuses or at home. By working together with the OVP, the SRD program can access specialized resources and interventions designed to address the root causes of violence and promote safety and well-being within the school community.

Overall, these partnerships enhance the effectiveness of the SRD program by providing access to a wide range of support services and resources tailored to the needs of students. By collaborating with the Department of Youth Development and the Office of Violence Prevention, the SRD program can fulfill its mission of maintaining a safe and secure learning environment while fostering positive relationships within the school community.

The SRD program also works with other areas and partnerships:

**Youth Summit Seminar:** These seminars build relationships with students to better connect with the school community.

**School Safety and Security Unit:** Collaboration involves sharing best practices, conducting drills, and implementing security measures to ensure a safe learning environment.

**Community Youth Programs:** Engaging with community youth programs enables SRDs to connect students with positive activities and support services outside of school, fostering a sense of belonging and reducing risk factors for delinquency.

**Adolescent Mental Health team:** Working with mental health professionals helps SRDs identify and support students struggling with mental health issues, ensuring they receive appropriate interventions and resources.

## **School Resource Deputy Trainings**

School Resource Deputies (SRDs) undergo various types of training to effectively fulfill their roles within schools. Deputies assigned to the School Resource Deputy program have participated in the following trainings:

**Conflict Resolution and De-escalation Training:** SRDs receive training in conflict resolution techniques and de-escalation strategies to help them resolve conflicts peacefully and prevent situations from escalating into violence. This training emphasizes communication skills, empathy, and the use of non-violent intervention tactics.

**Mental Health Awareness and Crisis Intervention:** Given the prevalence of mental health issues among students, SRDs often receive training in mental health awareness and crisis intervention. This training equips SRDs with the knowledge and skills needed to recognize signs of mental distress, provide initial support and referral to appropriate resources, and intervene effectively in crisis situations.

**School Safety and Security Training:** SRDs receive specialized training in school safety and security measures, which may include topics such as emergency response protocols, active shooter response training, threat assessment procedures, and school lockdown procedures. This training equips SRDs with the knowledge and skills needed to effectively respond to safety threats and emergencies in schools.

**Law Enforcement Training:** SRDs typically undergo standard law enforcement training, which includes topics such as criminal law, patrol procedures, firearms training, defensive tactics, and crisis intervention techniques. This training ensures that SRDs are prepared to handle a wide range of law enforcement responsibilities within the school environment.

By undergoing a variety of training programs, SRDs are better equipped to address the complex challenges of maintaining safety and security within schools while fostering positive relationships with students, staff, and the broader school community.



## **School Resource Deputy Program Statistics**

The SRD program utilizes two statistical codes to differentiate a program response vs a station response. 801 is used for criminal contact by a School Resource Deputy; 802 is used by the School Resource Deputies for non-criminal contacts.

In Quarter 4 2024, criminal contacts by a School Resource Deputy accounted for 5.30% of all calls entered by the deputies. A breakdown of call clearance code by month and station is shown below. \*\*Please note this is not a count of the number of contacts, but of the number of incidents.

##### **School Resource Deputy comments:**

Deputies spoke to two different classes at Loyde Continuation High School on “Life After High School”. Deputies continue to build positive relationships with students, staff and the community. Deputies have made themselves visible and approachable in order to foster trust and open lines of communication, making students feel more comfortable reporting concerns or issues.

### **East Patrol Division**

#### **Crescenta Valley Station**

##### **School Resource Deputy comments:**

Crescenta Valley Station participated in Red Ribbon Week, and it was a huge success at La Canada High School. The PTA parents put red ribbons ALL over the campus, like hundreds. Each day we had different activities planned. The School Resource Deputy had the MADD trailer with the crashed car inside for the students to see all week. At lunch deputies had activities like drunk goggles on tricycles, etc. They had students sign pledges to be drug free, students and staff told their stories about how alcohol/drugs have affected their lives (if a family member passed away, etc.). On Thursday, October 17<sup>th</sup> both Crescenta Valley High School, La Canada High School along with deputies participated in the “Great Shakeout” drill.

## **North Patrol Division**

### **Santa Clarita**

#### **School Resource Deputy comments:**

The School Resource Deputies were present at all of the home football games and basketball games. Staff provided security before and after the games. On Friday, December 13<sup>th</sup> the School Resource Deputies participated in “Coffee with a Cop” with school district staff, students and parents. Deputies worked closely with school administrators and staff to develop policies and programs that enhance student safety and well-being. On Friday, October 25<sup>th</sup>, Deputy Martinez spoke at the parent resource night providing information and support for mental and emotional support for families as well as substance abuse prevention. School Resource Deputies continued to maintain records of incidents and interventions that occurred on the school grounds.

## **South Patrol Division**

### **Lakewood Station/Norwalk Station**

#### **School Resource Deputy comments:**

School Resource Deputies conducted regular patrols along with random drug dog searches to ensure a safe environment, focusing on high-traffic areas like the hallways, cafeterias and school parking lots. Deputies worked with school administration to review, and update emergency preparedness plans. They also discussed trends, incidents, and safety plans. Deputies continue to build relationships with students ensuring they support a positive school culture focused on safety, education and the community. Deputies conducted an introduction walk through at Escalona Elementary with Principal Dr. Okapara. The deputies spoke with the children and teachers who asked questions and passed out Norwalk station stickers.

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
