School Resource Deputy Program

The primary mission of the School Resource Deputy (SRD) Program is to maintain and uphold a safe and secure learning environment while fostering positive relationships within the school community. The School Resource Deputies are not school disciplinarians. School Resource Deputies must recognize they will not become involved in discipline as it is a school matter and will be handled by school administrators. To achieve the mission effectively, the School Resource Deputy program should embrace multiple roles: mentor/educator, counselor, and peace officer.

- 1. School Resource Deputies serve as mentors and educators by actively engaging with students in various capacities. School Resource Deputies can lead the school administration by providing educational sessions on topics such as safety, bullying prevention, drug education awareness, and other current issues.
- 2. School Resource Deputies play a crucial role in supporting the well-being of students. They can serve as a resource for students experiencing difficulties, referral to appropriate support services, and intervention when necessary. School Resource Deputies can also collaborate with school officials to effectively develop and implement strategies for addressing student needs.
- 3. School Resource Deputies are responsible for maintaining safety and security within the school environment. School Resource Deputies play a crucial role in emergency preparedness and response, ensuring that students and staff are prepared for various crisis situations.

By supporting these roles, School Resource Deputies can achieve the overall goal of maintaining a safe and secure learning environment while also fostering positive relationships within the school community. Building trust and rapport with students, staff, and parents is essential for effective communication and collaboration, which are key components of successful school safety initiatives.

SRD Collaboration with Parents and Students

School Resource Deputies (SRDs) contribute significantly to the safety and well-being of school communities; they also face various challenges in fulfilling their roles effectively. By addressing these challenges through ongoing training, collaboration, and community engagement, School Resource Deputies can continue to make positive contributions to schools and support the success of all students. Below are comments and success stories from several School Resource Deputies.

North Patrol Division

School Resource Deputy Success Stories:

A school resource deputy stationed at David G. Millen Middle School encountered ongoing challenges with one particular student. The student had a long record of defiant behavior—frequently ditching class, wandering campus during instructional hours, getting into fights, and showing open disrespect to staff. He was also failing all his classes, and efforts to intervene had been largely unsuccessful.

At the start of the 2025 school year, the student was meeting with the principal regarding his behavior. During that meeting, the deputy happened to enter the office for an unrelated matter. As soon as the student saw the deputy, he stood up abruptly and declared, "I hate cops," before storming out of the office.

Recognizing the depth of the student's anger, the deputy approached him calmly and convinced him to sit down for a conversation. He asked the student to share why he felt so strongly. What followed was a candid and emotional discussion. The student opened up for the first time, revealing that his negative view of law enforcement stemmed from personal experiences: his father had been arrested multiple times, and he had recently lost a brother to gang violence. These experiences had left him with deep pain and resentment.

The deputy, moved by the student's story, decided to share his own. He spoke about his background, his journey to becoming a deputy, and the challenges he had faced along the way. His goal was to show the student that beneath the badge was a person—not an enemy, but someone who had also experienced hardship and made tough choices.

After listening to the deputy's story, the student paused and said, "I never saw it like that." For the first time, a connection had been made. The student stood up, shook the deputy's hand, and returned to class—a gesture that stunned the principal, who had never seen the student open up or respond with such respect before.

That moment marked a turning point. Throughout the rest of the school year, the deputy continued to check in regularly with the student. They had ongoing conversations—not just about school, but about life, family, and the future. With consistent support and guidance, the student began to slowly change his attitude and re-engage with his education.

After seeing the students' hard work and improvement, the principle and the school resource deputy created a new award to be presented during graduation "most improved student."

The resource deputy attended the school graduation and personally presented the student with the award.

South Patrol Division

School Resource Deputy Success Stories:

On April 10, 2025, John Glenn High conducted a scheduled K9 search on campus as part of its ongoing commitment to student safety and a drug free learning environment. The operation was a coordinated effort between the school's administration, campus security team, and deputies.

What made this effort stand out was the high level of planning and execution. The administrative and security teams worked together seamlessly to ensure the process was smooth, respectful, and minimally disruptive to the learning environment. Classrooms were checked efficiently, and students cooperated respectfully throughout the operation.

The success of the day reflected the strong culture of teamwork and communication among staff. It also showed students that safety and accountability are priorities at John Glenn, and that the entire school community is committed to maintaining a secure and supportive campus. This well-executed effort is just one showcase of how John Glenn continues to lead by example.

Central Patrol Division

School Resource Deputy Success Stories:

School Resource Deputies assigned to South Los Angeles Sheriff Station used graduations as an opportunity to connect with the community. School resource deputies set up an information booth at graduation ceremonies to meet with families, play games, and hold giveaways. This type of community outreach helped to build positive relationships between law enforcement and the public, especially with students and their families.

East Patrol Division

School Resource Deputy Success Stories:

School Resource Deputies partnered with local non-profit organizations to educate parents about the growing presence of drug-laced edibles disguised as everyday snacks like candy, chips, and cereal—many of which have been found in nearby tobacco shops.

Deputies also addressed the dangers of alcohol, marijuana, vaping, and pills, showcasing real vapes confiscated from students to help parents recognize what to look for.

In addition to raising awareness, the event focused on empowering parents with strategies to talk to their children about difficult topics such as drug use and sexual health—fostering open, honest conversations at home.
