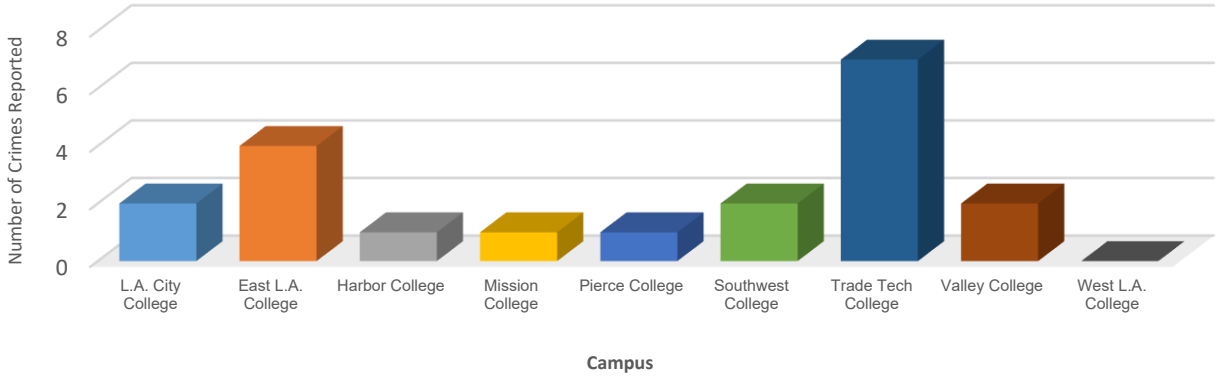

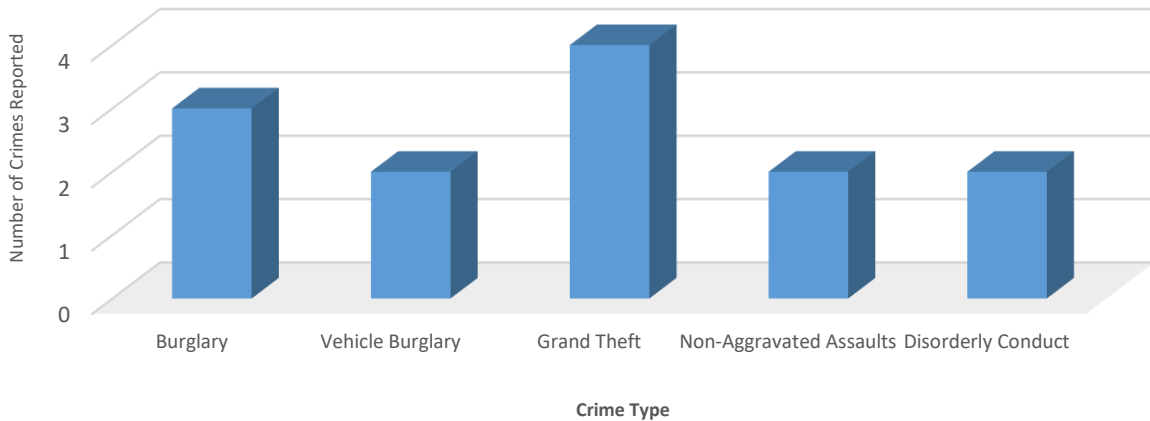

Total Part I & II By Campus

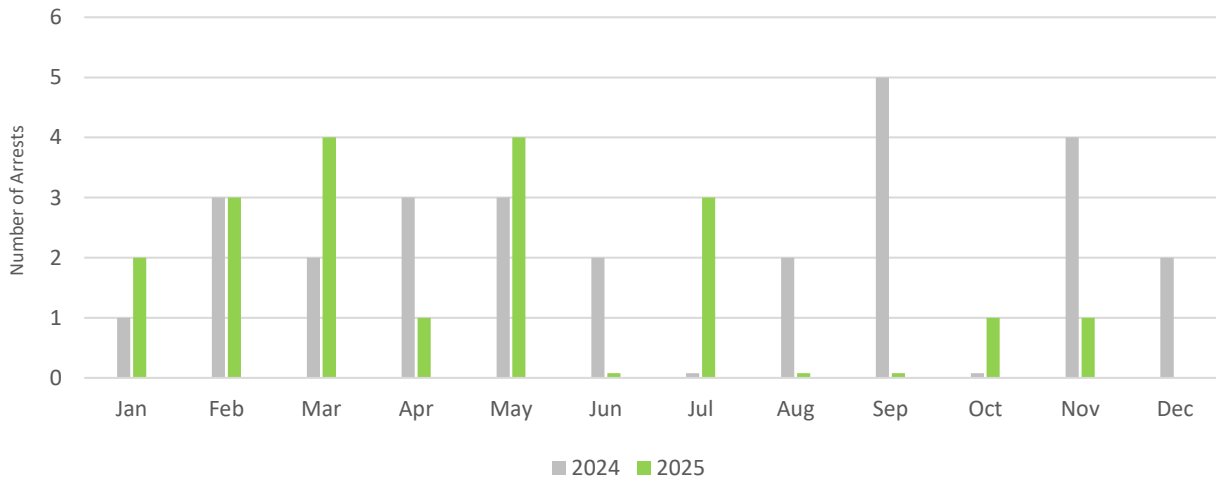

Year-to-Date Arrests by Month

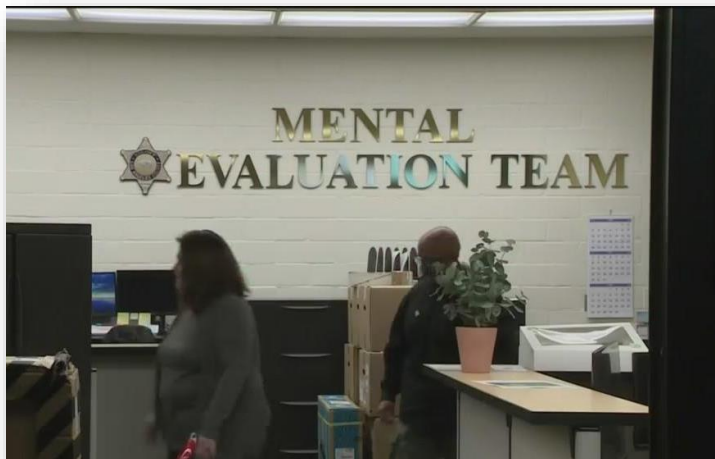

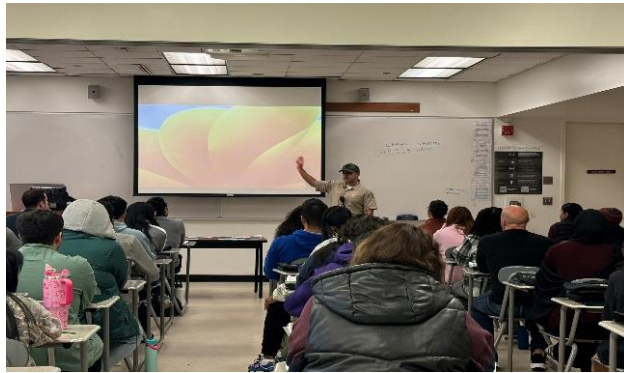
Training & Support Unit (TSU)

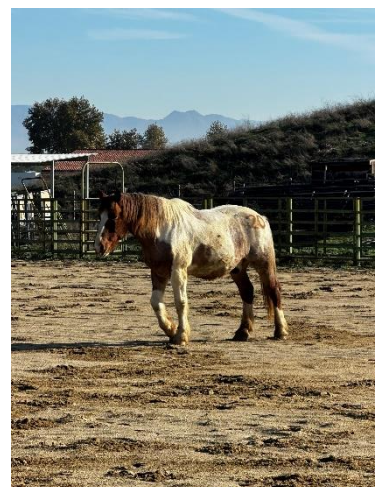
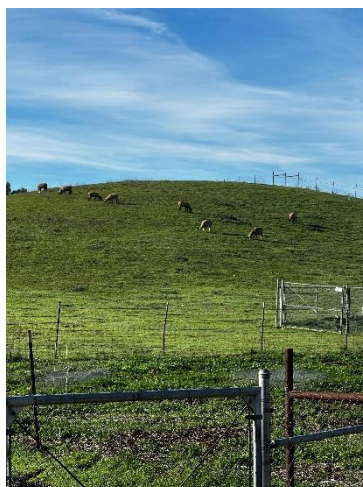
Los Angeles Pierce College



Los Angeles Pierce College (LAPC) encompasses 426 acres, making it one of the largest and most distinctive community college campuses in California. LAPC preserves a countryside atmosphere with its working farm, home to cattle, sheep, goats, and poultry. This unique resource supports the institution's agricultural and veterinary programs, offering students hands-on experience in a dynamic learning environment.

LAPC is home to more than 2,200 trees, thousands of roses, and a 1.9-acre botanical garden, providing abundant open space for students to study and relax. This unique combination of classrooms, farmland, and expansive green areas fosters a distinctive rural-meets-suburban atmosphere, setting LAPC apart from most urban colleges.

Campus safety is overseen by the Community College Bureau, whose personnel manage both traditional calls and the distinctive challenges of LAPC's environment. Their responsibilities range from securing escaped cattle to assisting with newborn goats and responding to local wildlife that frequently appears on campus. Public safety at LAPC extends beyond students and staff, encompassing the farm animals that are integral to LAPC's identity.
