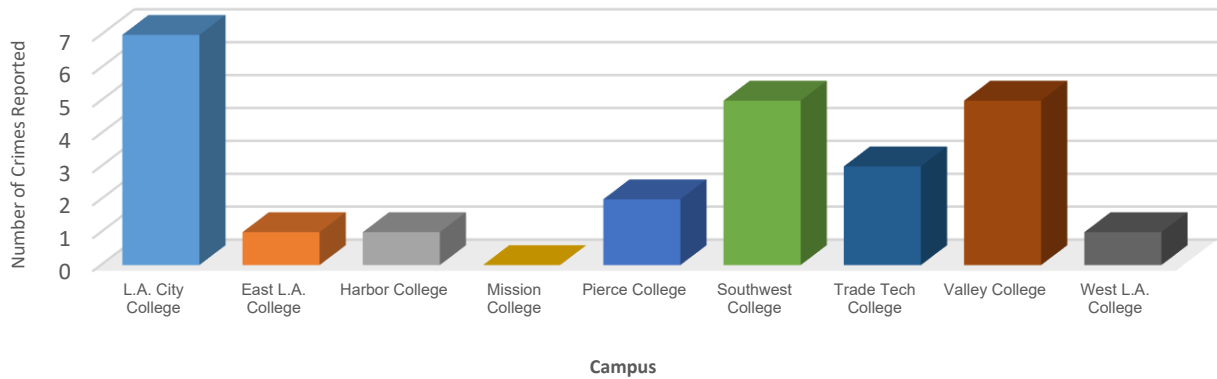

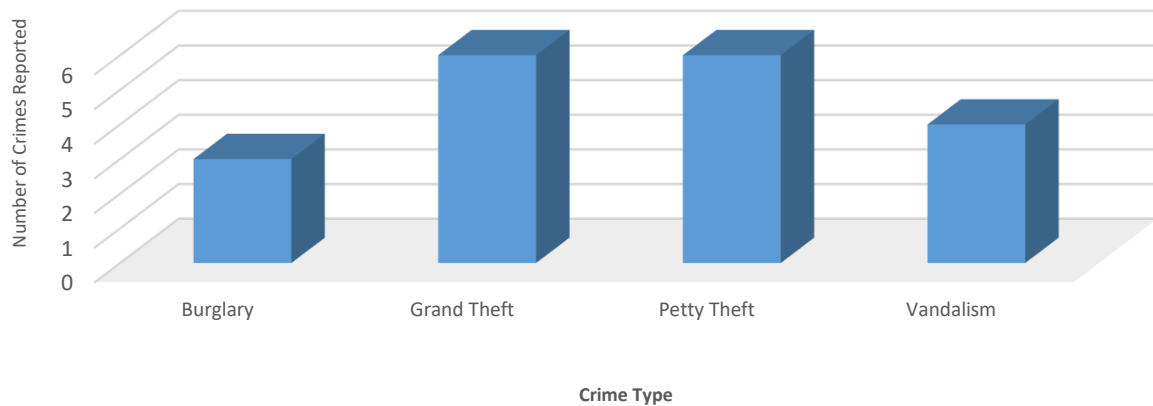

Total Part I & II By Campus

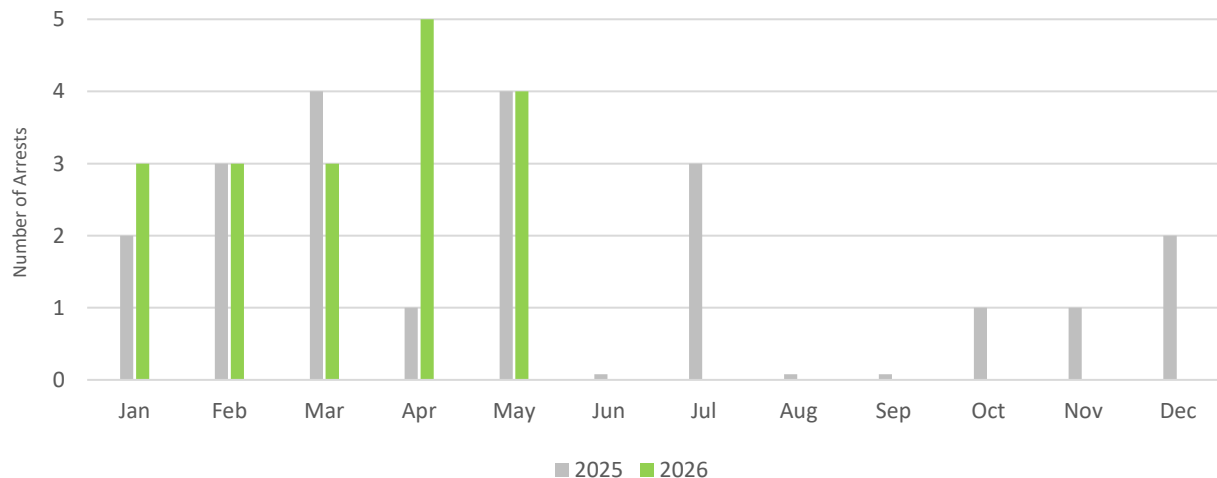

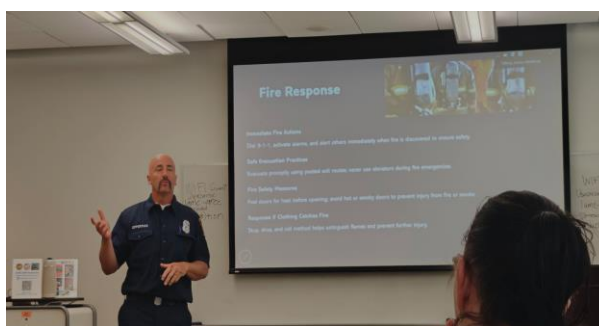
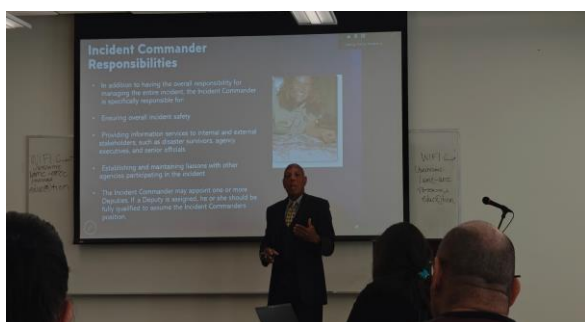


Los Angeles Mission College

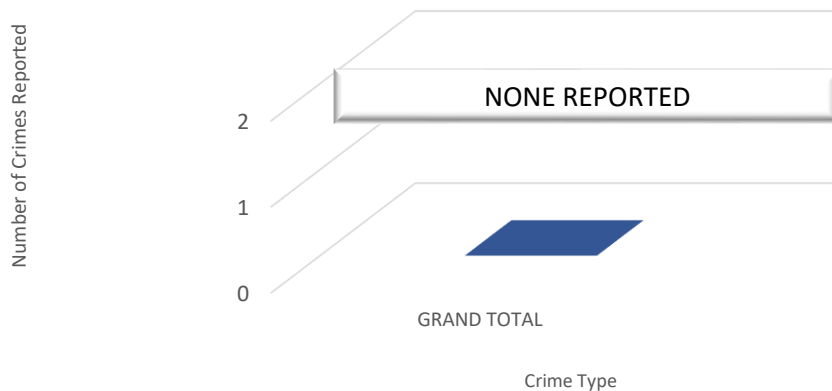

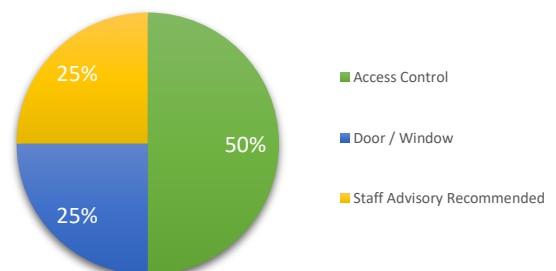

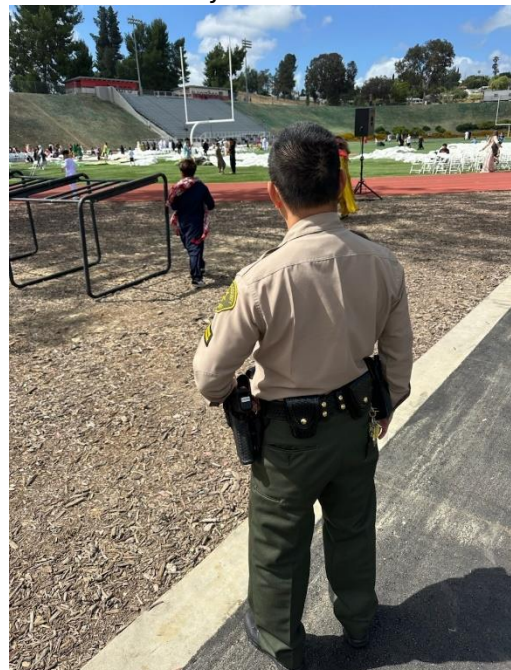


Los Angeles Pierce College
